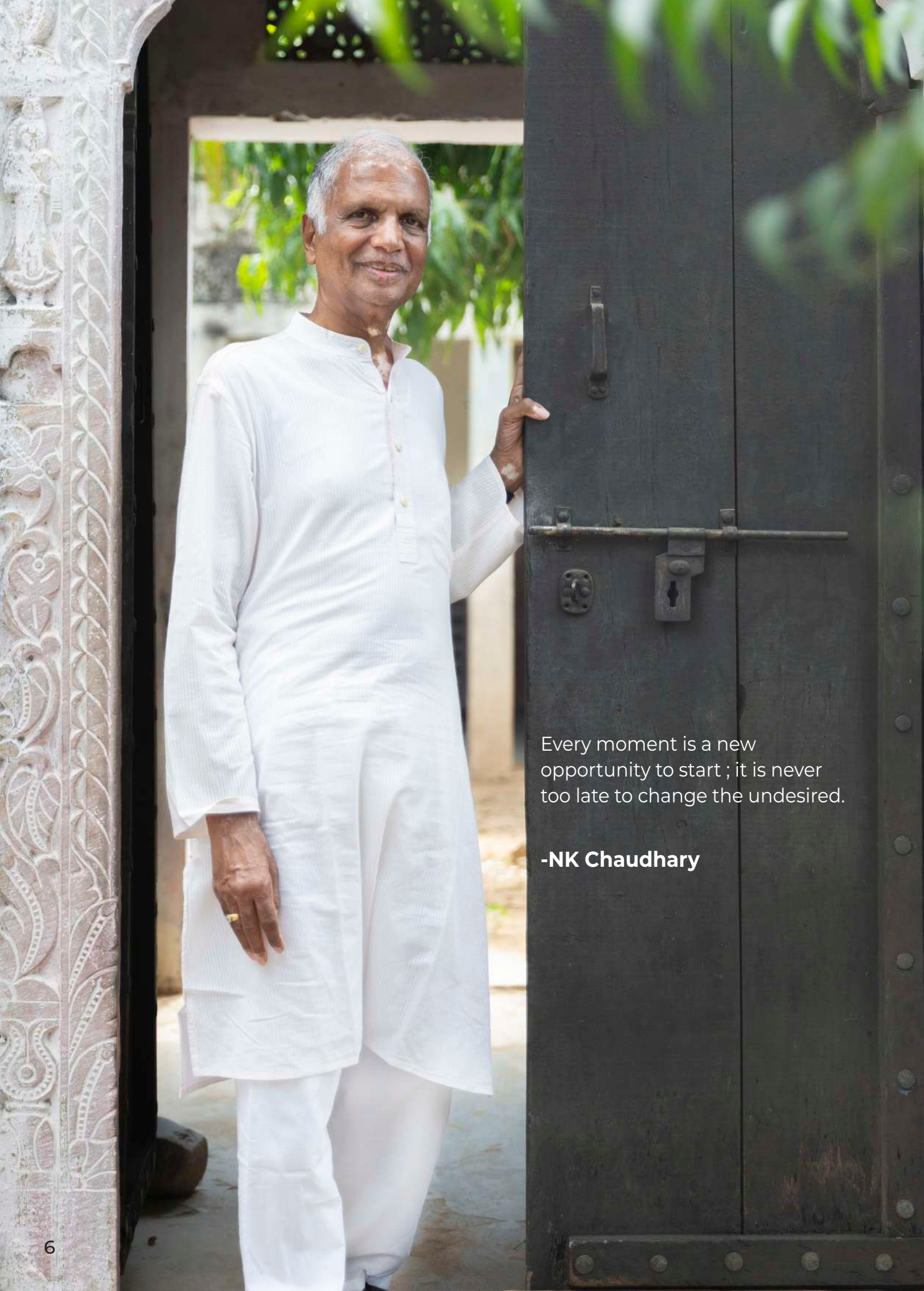

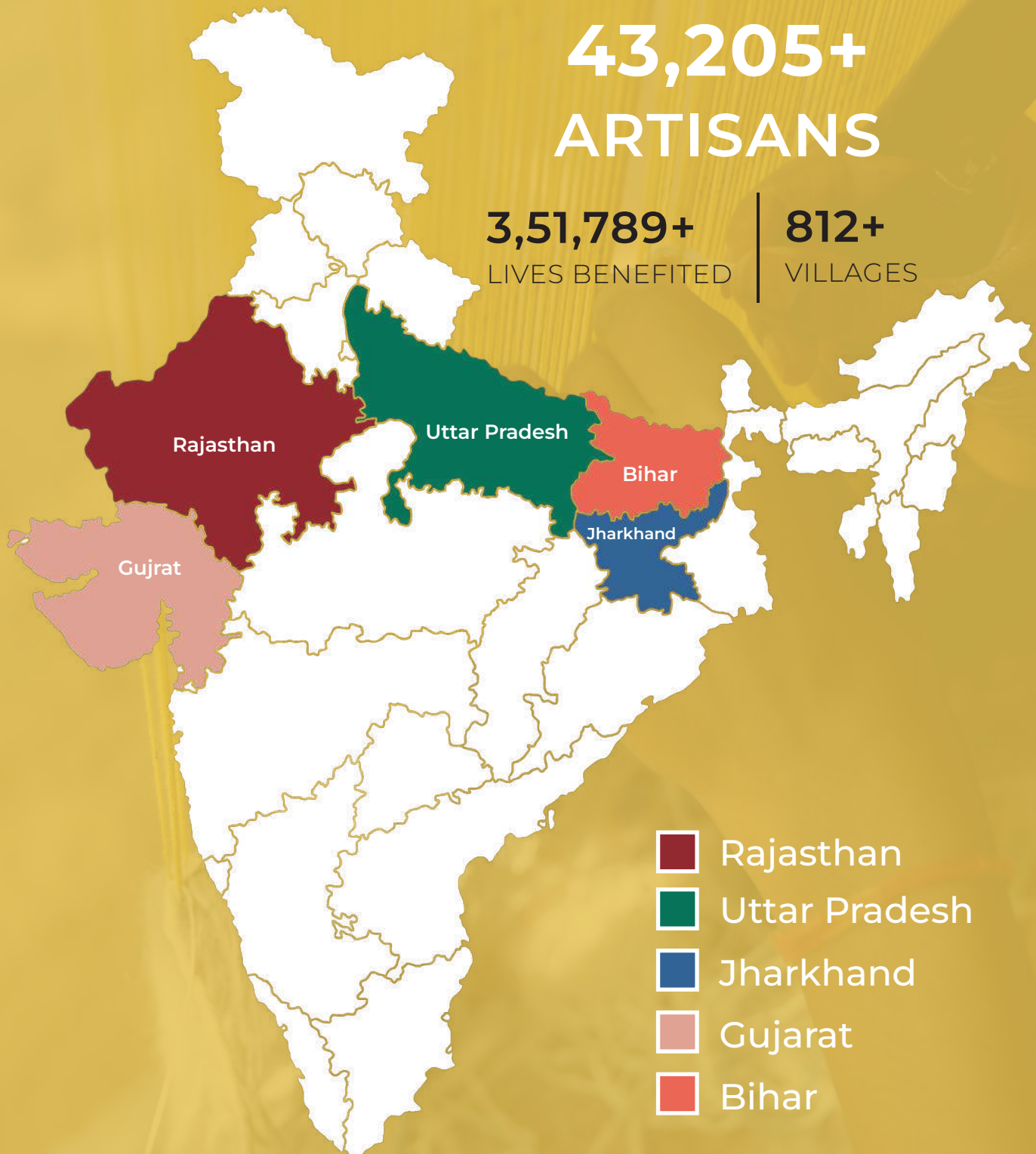

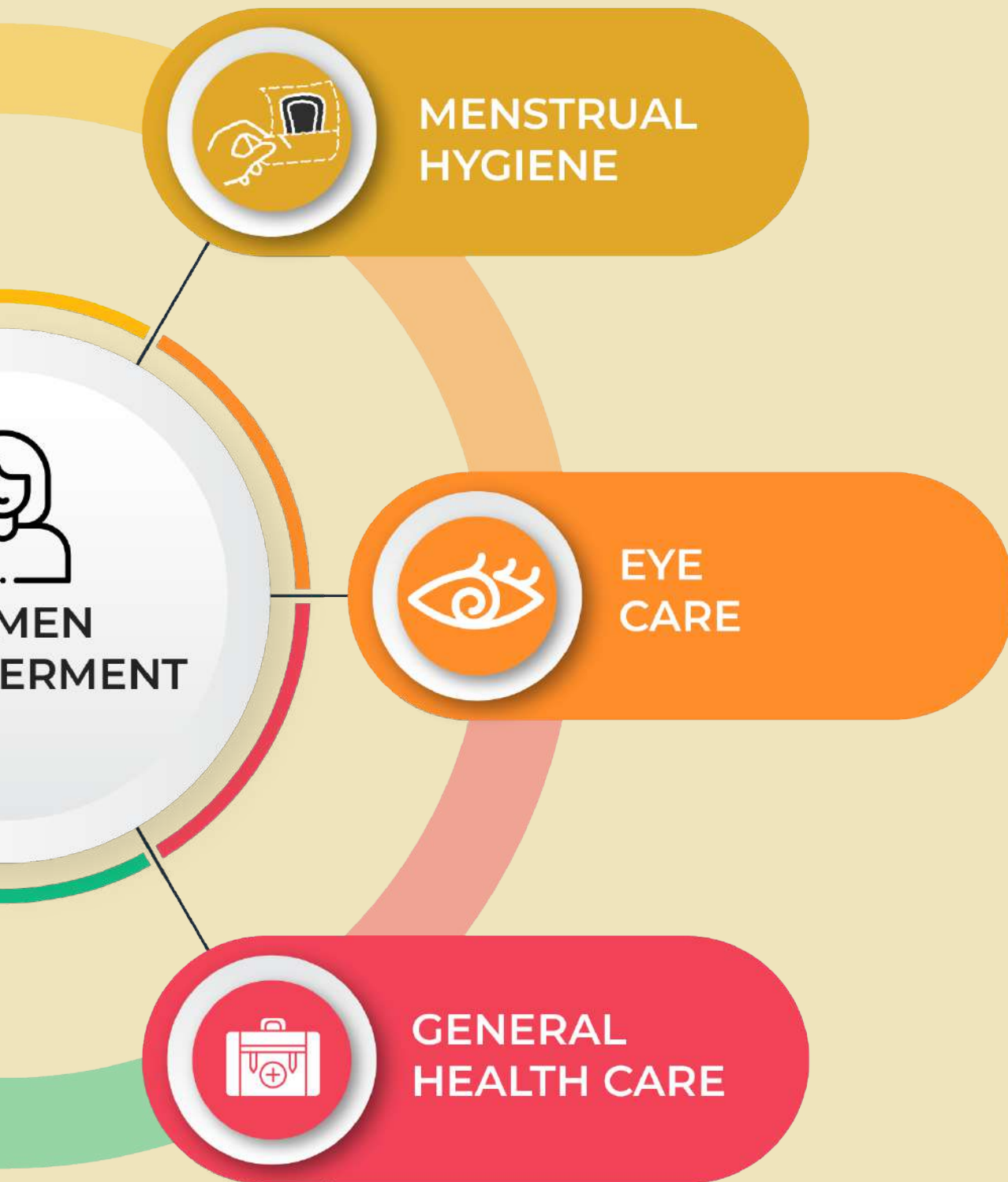

Impressed by Kareena's description of the holiday, especially her detailing about Santa's gifts under the Christmas tree and the beautiful decor of the tree with shimmering lights and candies, it started forming beautiful images in Manju's mind giving her an idea to weave her Manchaha as a Christmas celebration and surprise her daughter. A magical river ran through her design, and at the bottom of the rug, she lovingly portrayed colorful boxes to represent the special gifts for her daughter. She was fully immersed in the moment, and her art becomes a powerful expression of the awe she feels for the world around her. **“Leheriya Khet”** is the one manchaha that evokes her gratitude for the motherland that feeds her children and nourishes them with life and energy. That miracle of life on earth has been captured in her exquisite manchaha. As she worked on her design, Maina Devi was reminded of the many blessings in her life.



WELL PROGRAM

(women empowerment through livelihood & leadership)

Even though women constitute nearly half of the total population in India, there are significant disparities in their representation compared to men, especially in rural areas. Rural women often face a lack of equality, inclusiveness, and access to opportunities. The COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent lockdowns further exacerbated these challenges, leading to widespread unemployment among marginalized communities. Unfortunately, many rural women continue to be denied their right to equality.

Recognizing the need to address these issues, Jaipur Rugs Foundation joined forces with established organizations to tackle the impact of COVID-19 on marginalized communities in Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh. Their partnership aimed to provide effective skill sets and create stable employment opportunities right at the doorstep of those in need.



The WELL Program aims to teach the art of hand-knotted carpet weaving to the women of rural areas and make them financially independent by ensuring further livelihood opportunities.

PNB Housing Finance Limited- Pehel Foundation

In collaboration with Pehel Foundation which is a subsidiary of PNB Housing Finance Ltd. (PNBHL) and Jaipur Rugs Foundation (JRF) the project was implemented as an initiative to strengthen the economy of the most vulnerable community from Jaipur District of Rajasthan. In order to preserve the folk art and traditional craftsmanship of weaving, Jaipur Rugs Foundation and Pehel Foundation worked on reversing the trends and empowering the rural people at their doorstep.

The proposed intervention aimed at addressing the key gaps in the carpet value chain in a holistic and replicable manner as to ensure viable non-farm livelihood options for socially excluded communities.

FULFILLING FAMILY ASPIRATIONS

Saroj, once a stone worker in Tigariya village, underwent a transformative journey. she mastered weaving in six months. Her income increased from Rs. 2000-3000 /- month to Rs. 8000/- month, offering newfound freedom and self-worth.

Achieving financial independence, Saroj envisions a promising future for her family. Her earnings have lightened the load of household expenses and significantly contributed to her children's education. Supported by her husband, Saroj's weaving pursuits have opened doors to her dreams of transforming their home into a beautiful brick home, all made possible by her hard-earned income.

HCL Foundation

According to the 2011 census data, female literacy stands at a mere 53%, highlighting the pressing need to overcome the existing social structures and limited livelihood prospects that hinder women's empowerment and impede holistic development goals. To tackle this challenge, Jaipur Rugs Foundation implemented the Women Empowerment through the WELL initiative. This endeavor aimed to provide sustainable and accessible livelihood opportunities for women in the Kothawan block of Hardoi District, Uttar Pradesh, following a thorough feasibility study.

The success of the WELL initiative in Kothawan led to its expansion into two additional blocks, namely Ahirori and Sursa, within the Hardoi district. This expansion aimed to combat widespread poverty resulting from a lack of employment opportunities in the region. Rural women in the Hardoi district primarily relied on irregular income from traditional embroidery work known as "Chikankari/Karhai," which depended on fluctuating domestic market demand and offered minimal financial returns. The WELL project emerged as a fitting solution to address this prevalent issue by providing a sustainable livelihood source directly to the doorsteps of these women.



ANITA DEVI

ADVOCATING FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE IN HER VILLAGE

Anita Ji, a 37-year-old weaver from Hardoi, UP, and her husband struggled for income despite their efforts in crochet-making and wood collection. Through the collaboration of HCL Foundation and Jaipur Rugs Foundation, Anita learned weaving, finding a path to consistent earnings. She set up a loom at home after training. Her journey inspired other women to join and become financially independent. Despite her husband's illness and eventual passing within a year of weaving, Anita persevered, supporting her children through her craft. Weaving became her solace, ensuring timely carpet deliveries.

RAJASTHAN ROYAL FOUNDATION (RRF) & MUTHOOT PAPPACHAN FOUNDATION (MPF)

Women's empowerment plays a vital role in achieving sustainable economic growth and social development. Unfortunately, marginalized communities often find themselves trapped in a cycle of poverty due to various factors. One major obstacle is the limited availability of employment opportunities resulting from a lack of marketable skills. This challenge becomes even more pronounced when these communities reside in underdeveloped areas where only a few livelihood options exist.

MEETING RIGHT OPPORTUNITY AT THE RIGHT TIME

Mamta, a hardworking farm laborer, endured years of harsh sun and meager pay. Fate introduced her to hand-knotted weaving at the right time just as her husband's accident left him jobless. Amidst adversity, she embraced weaving, supporting her kids. With dedication, her earnings rose from Rs. 3,000 to an impressive Rs. 9,000, securing education for her kids and household needs. Weaving empowered her, gradually repaying debts and restoring her financial control. Her story shows seizing chances can truly transform lives, reinforcing her faith in the power of opportunity.

CRISIL FOUNDATION, DIDWANA RAJASTHAN



With the determination to break the chain of poverty and provide women with opportunities to thrive, the CRISIL Foundation & Jaipur Rugs Foundation are currently running Women Empowerment through livelihood & Leadership Development (WELL) with a vision to build a more inclusive & equitable society. By investing in the potential and capabilities of women in Didwana Rajasthan, they are not only transforming individual lives but also paving the way for the holistic development of entire communities

BHARTI'S PATH TO STABLE SOURCE OF INCOME

Just like most women from her village, Didwana, Bharti was also involved in farming. As a mother to 2 children, she faced a tough time running the household. However, as is the nature of agricultural work, she faced the challenge of working under the scorching sun while still struggling to earn a consistent income. Her husband works as a mechanic but doesn't earn much, making it difficult for the family to make ends meet.

Things turned around for her when she became a part of the skill development program initiated by Jaipur Rugs Foundation and CRISIL Foundation in Didwana. Through this program, she acquired the art of skill weaving. It has been 6 months since and she has found a regular source of income allowing her to contribute to household expenses more than her husband. She loves this work as she can do it from the comfort of her home, manage her household chores and children and bond with other women working with her. She finds fulfillment and joy in carpet weaving, making it a meaningful and sustainable livelihood option for her.



BHARTI

The Social Innovation & Design Lab Supported by RRF, MPF & implemented by Jaipur Rugs Foundation at Aspura, Rajasthan, is a pioneering initiative aimed at fostering social innovation and sustainable development in the rural community. The project focuses on harnessing the creative potential of local artisans and designers to address social challenges, promote economic empowerment, and preserve traditional craftsmanship.

HIGHLIGHTS

YARN PLAY

Artisans were taught about the various yarns and the qualities that are used for the weaving of a carpet, and what can be made using different qualities and types of yarns. This helped artisans understand how the quality of yarn can change the entire dynamics of the final product and how they can inculcate them in their weaving patterns.



DYEING

Jaipur Rugs dyeing team in Jaipur invited the artisans to showcase the different dyeing techniques that are used for the dyeing of the yarns used in the weaving of carpets. Trainee artisans also explored tie-dye dyeing, random dyeing, and more techniques & tried the same with their fellow artisans.

BUGLI

Bugali is a 20-year-old artisan. Her life story is poignant, as she took on the responsibility of supporting her family after losing her father at a young age. Weaving has given her hope and a source of livelihood, and she strives to incorporate the beauty of her surroundings into her work, with a desire to weave for the rest of her life.

TOTIYAA

BUGLI'S DESIGN LAB STORY

Bugali's art piece is a stunning tribute to nature, with a beautiful depiction of a female red parrot, or "Totiyaa". The bird's shape is intricately woven using yarns, creating a feather-like effect that gives it a lifelike appearance. The use of shades of brown adds depth and dimension to the piece, while the vibrant hues of red, orange, and pink in the bird's head make it a true standout.

The weaving techniques employed in the piece are masterful, with loops and cut piles of different lengths perfectly used to create a sense of texture and movement. Overall, Bugali's art piece is a testament to her creativity and skill, showcasing her ability to bring the beauty of nature to life through her art.





AANCHI DEVI

Aanchi is a 37 years-old artisan from Aspura and has been associated with Jaipur Rugs for 15 years. She is a mother to 5 children and her husband works as a daily labourer. She is a keen observer. She looks around for inspiration and tries to put her thoughts into her rugs. She overcame her family problems through weaving, which became a therapeutic outlet for her. She channeled her determination into her craft and left behind her worries on the loom. Her hard work paid off, allowing her to build a home from her earnings.

CHANDRA KALA -

Aanchi Devi's Design Lab Story

Aanchi Ji's art piece, "Chandra Kala," is a stunning depiction of the ocean and moon. She has weaved an ocean that shimmers under the moonlight, woven with exquisite detail and precision. The waves of the ocean are layered and textured. What makes the artwork particularly intriguing is the depiction of a broken moon. One half of the moon is a deep, dark blue, woven in high piles, while the other half is composed of multiple hues that suggest a moon from another galaxy. Aanchi ji has also included a scorpion tail in the ocean, which adds a symbolic dimension to the artwork. The scorpion tail is a powerful symbol of danger, but it is also associated with transformation and growth. Overall, Aanchi Ji's artwork is a stunning tribute to her talent and creativity.

CHANGU MANGU

Sonu (26) is from Jaipur. He is married and is a father of a little girl, 'Payal'. While Vijay (26) is from Bihar and Anil (25) is from UP. These three weavers share a strong bond of friendship. It is through weaving that they celebrate the bond and bring it together in the form of designs, colors and patterns.

Changu Mangu is a funny term in Hindi and is how the weavers describe their rug. They wanted to give their rug a playful name just as their relationship. The rug is filled with a lot of playful elements ranging from the balls with flowers protruding out of them. Sonu found this concept extremely innovative and weaved it into the rug. Moreover, he has also weaved in bindi, cosmetics, jewelry as he was reminiscing his sister-in-law who had a cosmetic shop.

While Anil weaved a gift box, vibrant stars along with colorful 'barfi' because he has a sweet tooth. Further in pursuit of designing a palace, Anil designed a fort. In addition to that, there are three plus symbols which denote each one of these friends. They have also woven clouds and their shapes as they imagine when they gaze at the sky

YAARANA

By BP Singh, Kaabil & Zamaal Badhshah, Central Jail Dausa



BP Singh (23) is from UP and has been in jail for around 2.5 years now. Kaabil (50), from Rajasthan, got married earlier and is a father of 3 boys and 2 girls while Zamaal Badhshah (34) belongs to Bangladesh. They share a room together and have been weaving together for the past 1.5 years. They learnt the art in the jail itself. Out of the three, Zamaal is really joyful and loves to sing to his friends at night.

Yaarana meaning friendship is how the three weavers describe their rug. BP Singh loves to play cricket and was reminiscing his young days while weaving the rug. Kaabil says, "Zamaal used to scold us with love whenever we used to make some errors on the rug but he would fix it."

The rug has designs of balls, kites, dots, lines and hearts symbolizing their friendship and love for each other. Moreover, there are some incomplete designs which showcase their efforts. They even weaved some motifs they call as time pass patterns which they made out of joy. The rug incorporates vibrant colors in harmony which are a reflection of their personality.

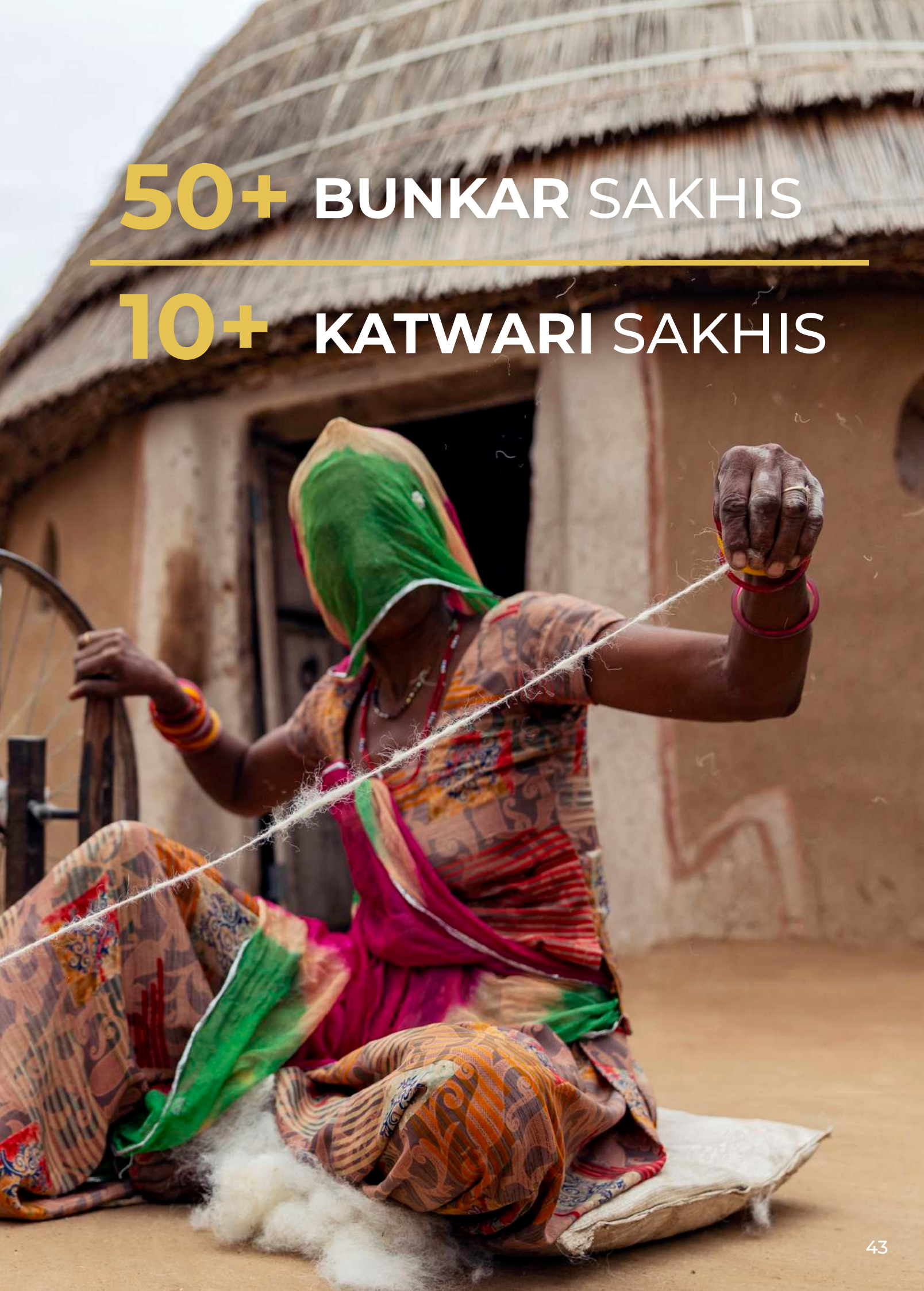
LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

HUMANITARIAN AID

In a collaborative effort with Zomato India, Jaipur Ration Foundation (JRF) spearheaded a vital initiative across 202 villages in Rajasthan. The Dry Ration Kits distribution program aimed at alleviating post-COVID-19 distress among grassroots artisans. Generously supported by Zomato India, the kits included essential staples, providing nutritional security and empowering artisans to rebuild their lives. ग्रामीण महिला डिजाइनरों के हाथ से बुने कालीनों की प्रदर्शनी शुरू

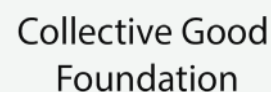
